## **Before We Begin**

## Why is privacy important?



The United Nations Conventions on the Rights of the Child is an agreement by countries that have promised to protect children around the world.

"Every child has the right to privacy. The law must protect children's privacy, family, home, communications, and reputation (or good name) from any attack"

In the fast-paced digital world, being 'on the go' isn't just about moving around physically; it's also about our online adventures. We want to keep our adventures fun and SAFE.

Private information can identify who you are. For example, if you tell someone your first name, it would be difficult to find where you live or go to school.

If I tell you my first name, that's just an edge piece of the puzzle, however, if I tell you my last name and what city I live in. It's like you just placed several pieces down and started to reveal a picture of 'you'.



This type of information does not identify who you are. For example, if I tell you I like pizza, that piece of the puzzle will not identify you. Lots of people in the world like pizza. Another example is your favorite color. If I tell you pink, lots of people like the color pink, you can not identify me. That piece of the puzzle does not complete my picture.



## **Teacher:**

Review with the students what is private and personal information. Encourage the students to have a whole group discussion on what is appropriate to share and what is not appropriate to share.

What is the difference between private and personal information? What other information can be added to the list? Use the space provided to add more examples of private and personal information.

## **Teacher:**


Students will now go to BSD Education's online platform to begin their guided project called "My Personal Webpage". Each step is outlined below and on the platform. The expected output is pictured for the student's reference.

## **Step 1: Introduction**

Welcome!

In this project, we will use HTML and CSS to create a personal webpage about yourself that describes who you are, your interests, and what you do.

The webpage will have a banner at the top, and the main content is organized into three separate sections underneath - go ahead and take a look at the example below!



## Step 3: Add a subheading

Next, let's add a subheading that tells visitors what this website will be about.

Example:


"Welcome to my webpage! I'm a musician and fashion designer. Here you can learn more about my work."



## Step 4: Add a banner image

#### Great job!


Next, let's add an image to our banner using the HTML <img> tag. We'll also give our image element an id attribute.




## Step 5: Add a heading to the first section


Now let's start adding the main content for our website!

Step 6: Add a paragraph






## Step 7: Add an image to the first row

Great job!


Next let's add an image to the first section.



### Step 8: Add text to the second row


#### Great job!

Step 9: Add an image to the second row


Now let's add an image to the second row.



### Step 10: Add text to the third row


#### Nice work!

## Step 11: Add an image to the third row


Now let's add an image to the third section.




### Step 12: Customize the background colors

Right now, our webpage uses a color palette of blue, yellow, and green - but if you like, we can use another color palette of your choice!






## Step 14: Change the font size
